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Course Guide

Course: CA 101 Elementary Carolinian I

1. Department

Languages & Humanities

2. Purpose

This is an introductory course in the Carolinian language and is intended to give students with little or no knowledge of Carolinian the confidence and competence to speak, understand, and write the language at an elementary level.

3. Description

A. Required/Recommended Textbook(s) and Related Materials

Required:

Jackson, Fredrick H. and Jeff C. Marck. *Carolinian-English Dictionary*. Honolulu: University of Hawaii Press, 1991.

B. Contact Hours

1. **Lecture:** 4 hours per week / 60 hours per semester

C. Credits

1. **Number:** 4
2. **Type:** Regular degree credits

D. Catalogue Course Description

This beginning level course is designed to help students develop basic competence in speaking, understanding, reading, and writing Carolinian. Students learn and reinforce their language skills through drills, dialogues, and group work. Carolinian orthography is introduced and practiced. English Placement Level: EN 083/084.

E. Degree or Certificate Requirements Met by Course

Fulfills the language requirement for associate degrees.

F. Course Activities and Design

Course activities include lectures, oral/aural exercises, written and oral drills, recitation and transposition of dialogues, group work, quizzes, a mid-term and final exam project. Homework includes weekly oral/aural practice and recording and transcribing of Carolinian pronunciation.

5. Estimated Cost of Course; Instructional Resources Needed

8. **Instructional Goals**

This class will introduce students to:

- 1.0 A core of common everyday Carolinian vocabulary and phraseology;
- 2.0 Imperative sentence structures using the full range of pronouns;
- 3.0 Both informational and yes/no question structures both orally and in writing;
- 4.0 Simple narrative discourse structures utilizing core vocabulary both in speaking and in writing;
- 5.0 Correct pronunciation, aural discrimination and spelling of Carolinian phones and prosody;
- 6.0 Correct socio-linguistic registers with an informal Carolinian social context; and
- 7.0 Carolinian orthography and writing simple sentences and questions.

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9. Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- 1.0 Employ a core of common everyday Carolinian vocabulary and phraseology in speaking and in writing;
- 2.0 Demonstrate an active and passive command of core Carolinian vocabulary in producing and comprehending imperative sentence structures;
- 3.0 Employ both informational and yes/no question structures both orally and in writing;
- 4.0 Demonstrate simple narrative discourse structures utilizing core vocabulary both in speaking and in writing;
- 5.0 Use correct pronunciation, aural discrimination and spelling of Carolinian phones and prosody;
- 6.0 Recognize correct socio-linguistic registers with an informal Carolinian social context; and
- 7.0 Use Carolinian orthography in writing simple sentences and questions in the appropriate register and tense.

10. Assessment Measures

Assessment of student learning may include, but not be limited to, the following:

- 1.0 Performance in written and oral drills,
- 2.0 Performance in recitation and transcription of dialogues,
- 3.0 Performance in group work,
- 4.0 Homework (weekly oral/aural practice and recording and transcribing of Carolinian pronunciation)
- 5.0 Quizzes,
- 6.0 A mid-term examination, and
- 7.0 A final exam project.
