Course: HI 202 Issues in the American Nation

1. Department: Social Sciences and Fine Arts

2. Purpose:

This course provides an advanced survey of American history from the post Civil War Reconstruction era to the present. Emphasis is on assessing eras, analyzing cause and effect of events, and evaluating issues in the United States; through reading primary sources documents, and writing on these issues. HI 202 has been articulated with the proposed honors curriculum at the Northern Marianas College.
