D. Catalog Course Description

This course is a requirement for the Certificate of Completion in Early Childhood Education. The course introduces the basic theories, methods, and activities that promote learning during the early childhood years. Content areas include the importance of developmentally appropriate and individually appropriate activities in the childcare setting that promote and support children's growth and development. Students will differentiate among the four developmental domains (physical, socio-emotional, language, and cognitive) for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers. In addition, they will also be introduced to strategies and components of a developmentally appropriate learning environment for early childhood. (Semester offered varies by academic year)

E. Degree or Certificate Requirements Met by Course

This is a required course for the Certification of Completion in Early Childhood Education.

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F. Course Activities and Design

This course is designed to incorporate lectures, readings, forums, in-class activities, demonstrations, topic discussions, student participation, assigned projects, collaboration and engagement.

- 4.0 The interrelationship between the developmental domains of young children and the learning materials and manipulatives that foster growth and development;
- 5.0 Why transitions are hard and how to facilitate smooth transitions;
- 6.0 The teacher's role and the role of families; and
- 7.0 Classroom management skills.

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9. Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1.0 Identify terminology and theories behind early childhood development;
- 2.0 Label the four developmental domains;
- 3.0 Explain developmentally appropriate practices for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers;
- 4.0 Distinguish how to create a developmentally suitable learning environment for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers using age-appropriate materials;
- 5.0 Present the teacher's role in smooth transitions in an early childhood classroom:
- 6.0 Describe the educator's role in managing the classroom; and
- 7.0 Categorize appropriate learning materials for young children.
