This course offers a more in-depth examination of personality and its relationship to human development beyond the introductory courses of PY101 General Psychology, PY102 Abnormal Psychology, and PY201 Human Growth and Development. Concepts, issues, and theories of personality and human development are explored within the context of a multidisciplinary systems approach. The focus is on the interrelation of the development and understanding of personality from primarily a psychosocial perspective along with an emphasis upon psychological biography and narrative psychology. Prerequisites: PY101, PY102, or PY201 (Offered Fall/Spring).
